Principal's Message

As Spring break commences I would like to congratulate students and staff on the progress made towards teaching and learning goals throughout Term 3 and also highlight the three high impact influences on student progress;

Attendance - if students are not in class then they are not learning the content needed to achieve their academic goals. Inconsistent attendance also significantly impacts on learning as students miss chunks of information vital to being able to connect concepts.

Explicit teaching- this is an ongoing professional learning focus for all teachers and one that our teachers do exceptionally well. Explicit teaching involves clearly showing students what to do and how to do it, rather than having students discover that information themselves. Students who experience explicit teaching practices make greater learning gains than students who do not experience these practices.

Parents as partners in learning- research shows that students benefit from strong, supportive partnerships between home and school. Ensuring students are well prepared for school by having good routines at home, adults speaking positively about the benefits of education now and in the future, keeping good communication with school staff by contacting the school when you have concerns, reading the newsletter and returning permission notes on time.

I wish everyone an enjoyable and restful break and look forward to seeing everyone for an exciting Term 4.

As part of the Chaplaincy program, our school has provided funding support for all students to have access to a cooked breakfast on Mondays throughout Terms 2 and 3. This program will be extended in Term 4to offer all students access to cereal and milk on the other four mornings (Tuesday to Friday). Students can access Breakfast Club between 8.30-8.50am each morning.

If we don't try to stop inflation we're letting it grow, as we need to get up and try!


We need to pry open our mouths

so take a moment to realize that you might never be able to see the autumn leaves rustle in the wind because in some time the sky will be covered in a blanket of darkness


Without the golden beacon of light we call the sun think about what won't survive


Deep in the African Jungle






The BFG

This Term the Bigibila class has been reading the book "The BFG" This book is a novel written by Roald Dahl. Students enjoyed this story so much that upon completing the novel they were given a treat of watching the movie. Roald Dahl's The BFG is essentially a tale of friendship, empathy, and courageous actions. It offers lessons about the importance of standing against wrongdoings, irrespective of one's size or power. The bond between Sophie, a small vulnerable girl, and BFG, a giant with a kind heart, demonstrates the value of companionship and understanding.

Chaplain's Report

This morning I spent a few hours in the school garden - sorting out the garden shed, spreading compost onto the garden, mulching and adding some manure to the new compost that we are starting. It was a productive time and very satisfying.

The gardening items in the shed are now easy to find and access - have you had those moments when you have everything in its place and life flows along smoothly? Wonderful, but, unfortunately (for me anyway!) it does not happen that often.

The compost that was carefully turned and watered last term has been waiting to be placed on gardens and oh, it is beautiful. Dark and moist, smelling like a rainforest and FULL of worms. I have high expectations of what we will be able to produce over summer. It takes a lot of work to make a good compost - collecting the ingredients in the right proportions of carbon to nitrogen, adding water and some compost-boosting bacteria and turning, turning, turning. Each time the original ingredients become more like 'soil'. Again all the best things in life require us to work at them - take the time these holidays to think about what is important to you (relationships, health) and make some time to build these so that they can flourish.

Mulching makes such a difference to the garden, increasing its water holding capacity, keeping the soil cool in summer and encouraging lots of soil life to thrive. It also adds more organic matter to the soil, increasing soil nutrients. The little things really do count and can make our lives and the lives of those around us more pleasant. A simple thank you can really make someone feel appreciated.

And the cycle continues in the compost bin. Weeds, food scraps, pruning's, manure - all things that are considered to be waste and they will become that beautiful compost. Sometimes our lives may feel aimless, purposeless, we may wonder "What's the point?" and it may feel like

manure. But just like the compost, if we find people who can support us through the difficult times, we can find the 'waste' in our lives turning into something productive and worthwhile.

Healthy Recipe

Indian Flatbread with a Leafy Salad

Flatbread (makes 32 small flatbreads) Serve with salad or dip Ingredients:

2 tsp salt

2 cups lukewarm water

5 tablespoons olive oil

1kg plain flour, plus a little extra for dusting

Method:

- Preheat the oven to 50°C.
- Pour the water into a small bowl. Add salt and stir to dissolve. Add oil.
- Put the flour in a large bowl. Pour in the water mixture and mix.
- Sprinkle flour on a clean work surface.
- Knead dough for about 8 minutes.
- Return dough to a floured surface. Divide into 32 even pieces, each the size of a walnut.
- Flatten each piece with your hand, then roll it out thinly with a rolling pin, to about 10cm diameter.
- Heat the frying pan. Place a few discs of dough into a hot, dry pan and cook for 2 minutes. Flip and cook for a further 2 minutes. They are ready when golden brown with a few bubbles and darker spots.
- Transfer to a baking tray, cover with foil and place in a warm oven.

Leafy Salad (6 serves)

Ingredients:

Dressing:

1 clove garlic, peeled and finely chopped

Salt to taste

Juice of 1 lemon or lime or 3 tablespoons red-wine vinegar

1/3 cup olive oil

Freshly ground black pepper, to taste

4 cups mixed salad leaves, washed, dried and torn

2 cups mixed small leaves and soft-leaved herbs, washed, dried and torn (eg. rocket, beetroot leaves, sorrel, mizuna)

Method:

- Dressing place garlic in a mortar with a pinch of salt and pound with a pestle until it becomes paste.
- Add lemon juice
- 3. Stir in olive oil, add pepper and whisk to combine all ingredients.
- Salad tip all ingredients into a large bowl, add dressing and turn gently with tongs or your hands to coat them with the dressing.
- Serve with flatbread.



Minister's 2024 Christmas Card Competition


